Study: Dane, other counties have drug 'shooting galleries'

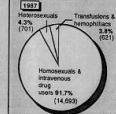

There are "shooting galleries" where junkies congregate in Dane and at least six other Wisconsin counties, and intravenous drug abuse permeates the state, a task force drug abuse and AIDS report said today.

The findings in a survey of nearly 600 alcohol and drug agencies indicate that AIDS could be spread among drug users in Wisconsin through sharing of needles, according to a report submitted to the Task Force on Intravenous Drug Abuse and AIDS.

Recommendations between now and June on how Wisconsin can stem the spread of AIDS among drug abusers, said Dr. Jose Daloz of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Medical School, who is the task force chairman.

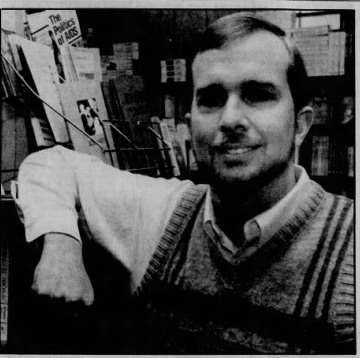
